


Proceedings of the Workshop on the Human Dimensions of Global Change: A Review of Selected Papers

The Workshop on the Human Dimensions of Global Change was held in Washington, D.C., from July 10-12, 1990. The workshop was sponsored by the National Science Foundation, the Environmental Protection Agency, and the National Aeronautics and Space Administration. Each working group met for two days to discuss the state of the science in their respective areas. The working groups then presented their findings to the full workshop. The workshop concluded with a plenary session in which the participants discussed the implications of the workshop findings for research, policy, and education.

The workshop proceedings have been published in a special issue of the journal *Global Environmental Change*. The proceedings include papers from each of the working groups, as well as a synthesis paper by the workshop chairs. The synthesis paper provides an overview of the workshop findings and identifies key research needs.



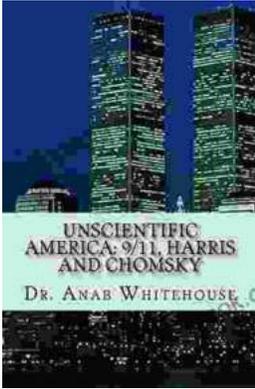

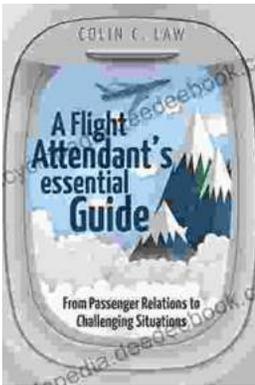
